



BOWL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

MOUNTAIN WEST BOWL SYNOPSIS

The Mountain West has agreements to send four teams to bowl games in 2011. Since the league's inception in 1999, the Mountain West has posted a 29-17 bowl record and has captured the Bowl Challenge Cup four times in the last seven years.

Unless an MW team qualifies for a BCS bowl game, the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas has the first selection of MW teams, followed by the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl and the AdvoCare V100 Independence Bowls with the second and third selections, respectively. The Gildan New Mexico Bowl has the fourth choice.

ABOUT THE BCS

The Bowl Championship Series (BCS) is a five-game arrangement for postseason college football that is designed to match the two top-rated teams in a national championship game and to create exciting and competitive matchups between eight other highly-regarded teams in four other games. The bowl games participating in the BCS are the Fiesta Bowl, Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl and Sugar Bowl. In addition, the BCS National Championship Game will be played at one of the four bowl sites.

BCS STANDINGS

Since the 2000 regular season, the BCS Standings have been compiled by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. The Standings include three components: *USA Today* Coaches Poll, Harris Interactive College Football Poll and an average of six computer rankings. Each component will count one-third toward a team's overall BCS score. All three components shall be added together and averaged for a team's ranking in the BCS Standings. The team with the highest average shall rank first in the BCS Standings.

MOUNTAIN WEST AND THE BCS

The champion of the Mountain West (along with the champions of Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference, the Sun Belt Conference and the Western Athletic Conference) will have an automatic berth in a BCS bowl game if either:

- Such team is ranked in the top 12 of the final BCS Standings, or;
- Such team is ranked in the top 16 of the final BCS Standings and its ranking in the final BCS Standings is higher than that of a champion of a conference that has an annual automatic berth in one of the BCS bowls.

Results from the 2008 to 2011 regular seasons will be evaluated to determine whether a seventh conference earns automatic qualification for the 2012-13 and 2013-14 bowl games. The evaluation process includes the following for each conference:



1. **Average Ranking of Highest-Ranked Team:** the ranking of the highest-ranked team in the final BCS Standings each year (if a conference does not place a team in the final BCS Standings, then its highest-ranked team is determined by the conference member that has the highest average ranking in the computer rankings used in the BCS Standings)
2. **Average Conference Ranking:** The final regular-season rankings of all conference teams in the computer rankings used by the BCS each year
3. **Top 25 Performance Ranking:** The number of teams in the top 25 of the final BCS Standings each year, with adjustments to account for differences in the number of members of each conference.

A conference will become the seventh automatic qualifier if it finishes among the top six conferences in both No. 1 and No. 2 and if its ranking in No. 3 is equal to or greater than 50 percent of the conference with the highest ranking in No. 3.

A conference will be eligible to apply to the Presidential Oversight Committee for an exemption if it finishes among the top six in both No. 1 and No. 2 and if its ranking in No. 3 is equal to or greater than 33.3 percent of the conference with the highest ranking in No. 3, or if it finishes among the top seven in either No. 1 or No. 2 and among the top five in the other and if its ranking in No. 3 is equal to or greater than 33.3 percent of the conference with the highest ranking in No. 3. To determine the "top 25 Performance Rating," points will be awarded to the conferences based on their teams' finishes in the top 25 of the final BCS Standings each year.

The computations will be made according to the conference's membership on December 4, 2011.

If the BCS continues under the same or a similar format, conferences will be evaluated on their performances during the 2010 to 2013 regular seasons to determine which conferences without bowl contracts will have automatic status from 2014 to 2017.

BOWL NOTES

The MAACO Bowl Las Vegas, which is owned and operated by ESPN Regional Television (ERT), is commemorating its 20th game in 2011 by using a special logo. Kickoff will be 5 p.m. PT on Thursday, Dec. 22 and the game will be televised by ESPN HD. The MAACO Bowl Las Vegas is now the 16th-oldest bowl game in existence and the 13th-oldest located in the same city. The 2011 game will host a Mountain West team for the 13th consecutive year and pit it against the No. 5 selection from the Pac-12 Conference.

The bowl is welcoming two new host hotel partners in 2011 as for at least the next three years, the Mandalay Bay Resort will be home to the Pac-12 Conference representative and the Hard Rock Hotel will house the Mountain West team for the first time ever and also serve as the event's official media headquarters.

Since entering into the original agreement in 1999, teams from the MW have posted a 7-5 record in the MAACO Bowl Las Vegas. Utah claimed the league's first bowl victory with a 17-16 defeat of Fresno State in 1999. Last year, the 19th edition of the bowl saw its highest-ranked matchup ever with No. 10/10 Boise State downing No. 21/20 Utah, 26-3. Last year's bowl week provided an estimated total of \$28.6 million in economic impact courtesy of 36,050 out-of-town visitors to Southern Nevada. It also drew the highest TV ratings of any ERT-owned bowl in history.

The 2010 game sold out for the sixth consecutive year. The attendance was 41,923, which marked the second-biggest crowd for a MAACO Bowl Las Vegas. The host stadium, which is also home to UNLV football, has a capacity of 36,800 but accommodates additional fans. The 44,615 that saw BYU down Oregon in 2006 remains the largest crowd to see a team sporting event in the state of Nevada.

BOWL NOTES

On April 27, 2005, Holiday Bowl organizers introduced San Diego's newly-established second bowl game as the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. Make-A-Wish Foundation® of San Diego has served as the game's beneficiary since its inception.

The seventh annual San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl will kick off at 5 p.m. PT on Wednesday, Dec. 21 at Qualcomm Stadium. The bowl will air on ESPN and match teams from the Mountain West and Western Athletic Conferences.

Last year's game featured a 35-14 San Diego State victory over Navy in front of a Poinsettia Bowl-record 48,049 fans. The game garnered a 2.6 rating on ESPN. The Aztecs were led by freshman running back Ronnie Hillman, who rushed for 228 yards and 3 TDs, and caught another TD pass to earn the game's Offensive MVP trophy. The game was played at Qualcomm Stadium, where only 24 hours earlier the field was flooded by over 1.5 million gallons of water. City and stadium officials spent all night pumping and draining the stadium, and were even able to get the paint down for the logo at midfield before kickoff.

BOWL NOTES

The Mountain West claimed its fourth straight victory in the New Mexico Bowl with BYU's 52-24 victory over UTEP on Dec. 18, 2010. The Cougars' win in the 5th Annual New Mexico Bowl was the first game of the college football bowl season and started another great postseason for the MW. Freshman quarterback Jake Heaps threw for four touchdowns, three of those scoring strikes going to Cody Hoffman, as the Cougars put the finishing touches on a 7-6 season. The BYU defense was also stellar, intercepting the Miners four times.

The 2011 marks a new era for the event. The Gildan New Mexico Bowl will feature a Mountain West team against, for the first time, a team from the Pac-12 Conference. Gildan, a vertically-integrated marketer and global manufacturer of quality branded basic apparel, and the leading active wear brand in the screen-print market in the U.S. and Canada, enters its first year as the game's title sponsor.

The Gildan New Mexico Bowl will once again kickoff the college football postseason as the first bowl game of the year. Kickoff at University Stadium in Albuquerque will be at Noon MT on ESPN HD.
